12. Course Description				
Students are introduced to the concept of economic development. Development economics is a distinct field in the economics portfolio, consisting of the theory and application of economic principles to the developing, low and middle income countries of the world. Whilst necessarily concerned with the efficient allocation of resources, economic stability and the growth of aggregate output, it also deals with the institutional, economic and social mechanisms needed to deliver improvements in welfare in developing countries. The course consists of two parts: an introduction to some of the theories of development, followed by study of some of the project planning and management tools employed in practice by development economists. On completion of the course students should have a basic understanding of the main concepts of development economics. They will also be able to apply the project planning and management tools of financial and economic appraisal and logical project frameworks to simple economic development problems.				
13. Teaching/Learning Strategies				
The course is taught using a combination of lectures and class discussions. Frequent use is made of classroom exercises. Students are required to engage with these, either individually or in groups. Students will frequently be required to discuss issues with their colleagues and report back to the plenary class
